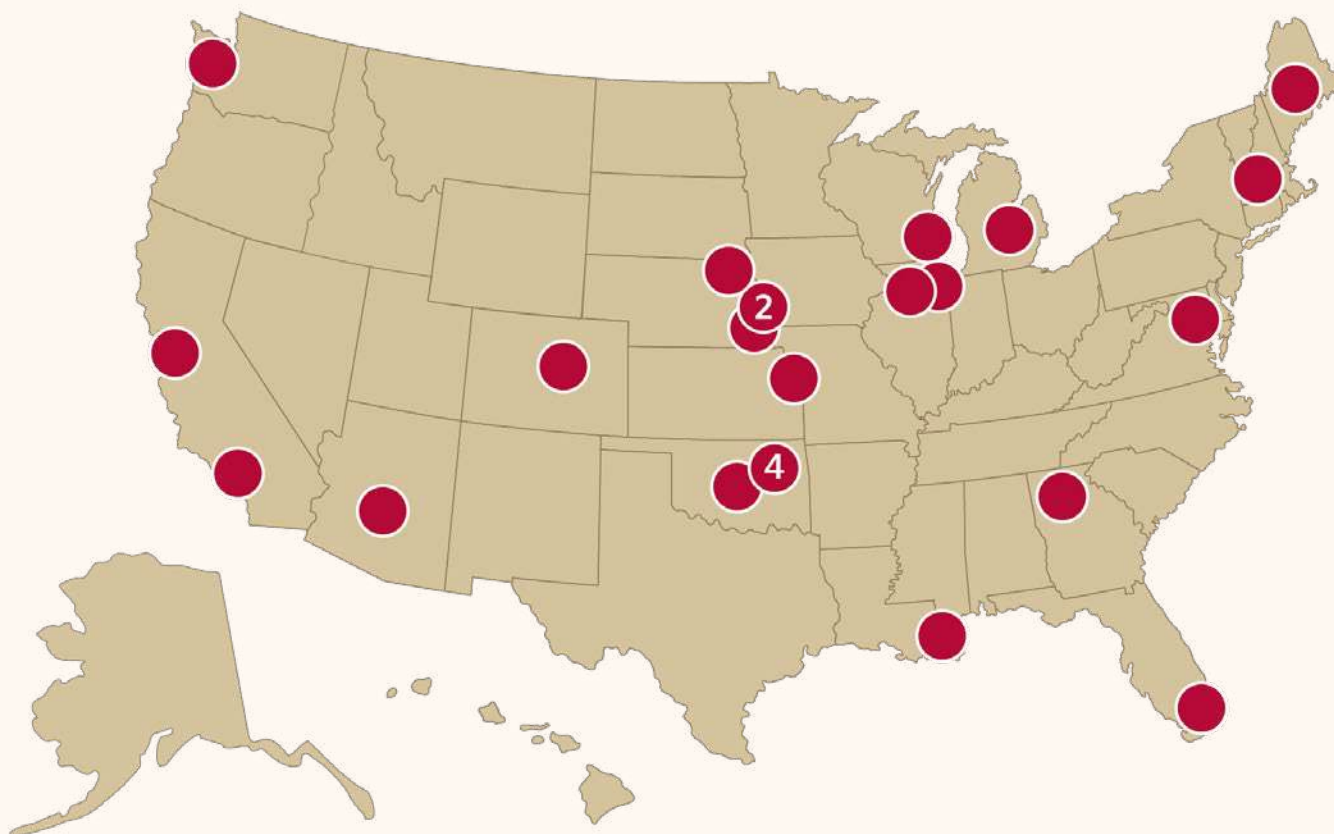

Our Reach



Our Work

Our work towards a future where every child can thrive begins in the classroom and reaches beyond Educare schools, positively impacting our communities, the broader early childhood field, and our society as a whole. Here's how the Educare Network is shaping early childhood systems.



Elevating Family Leadership

This year, Educare parents, staff, researchers and community partners jointly developed a [comprehensive national strategy](#) to strengthen family leadership efforts for the entire Network, reinforcing Educare as a driver of change and an advocate for legislation that benefits children, families and communities. Additionally, 13 Educare schools received funding to start or grow their individual family leadership programs and went on to launch Network-wide training and peer-to-peer mentorship opportunities.

As a result, 15 family leaders from 10 Educare schools shared their voices and lived experiences to advocate for relevant, meaningful policies that impact their children and families, standing out as speakers and facilitators on a national scale at the 2023 National Head Start Association Parent and Family Engagement Conference, the 2024 Educare Network Meeting, and the 2024 National Anti-Hunger Policy Conference. Family leaders were also featured in national media outlets including the [New York Times](#), [NBC News](#), and [USA Today](#).

To further elevate family leadership, we also welcomed Office of Head Start Director Khari Garvin to the 2024 Network Meeting, where he met with parents from Educare Winnebago and discussed how Educare is positioned to influence policy and advocacy at the local, state and federal levels.

Supporting Practitioners through Professional Learning

This year, the Educare National Office provided consultation, professional development and peer learning opportunities to all 25 operating Educare schools, as well as ongoing guidance to new Educare schools in development. These experiences resulted in more than **7,700 hours of support** for nearly **600 Network members** across all areas of our work together.

One of our biggest professional learning events, the [annual Network Meeting](#), was hosted in 2024 by Educare Winnebago in Sioux City, Iowa. Guests were welcomed by the tribal council of the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska, and joined sessions focused on an incredible breadth of topics, from elevating family voice to building school culture, Native American and Tribal influences on early childhood education to trauma-informed care, healing-centered engagement and more. At the Network Meeting, as well as various additional trainings and meetings throughout the school year, we were able to provide Continuing Education Credits (CEUs) to nearly **100 providers**.



Addressing the Workforce Crisis

The Educare Network is committed to developing a comprehensive recruitment and retention strategy that ensures Educare schools and beyond have highly educated early childhood professionals in every classroom. As part of that commitment, we created a task force comprised of school and National Office staff and research partners to inform the Network's workforce efforts.

During the 2023-2024 school year, this task force conducted a landscape scan to compile and analyze wide-ranging benefits and current recruitment and retention strategies at Educare schools.

Solutions to Early Childhood Workforce Challenges

Educare schools in Atlanta and the Chicago suburbs are [addressing workforce challenges](#) through hiring practices and continuing education.



From the landscape scan, the task force plans to launch a research study in the 2024-2025 school year to more fully identify the practices, policies, necessary resources and costs that can help make a positive difference in this critical area of our work within and beyond the Network.

Amplifying Our Work in the Field

Educare leaders and staff shared innovations, key learnings, and best practices within and beyond the walls of Educare, contributing data, expertise, and recommendations for practice, research and policy to the broader early childhood field. Through this work, the Network invited more early childhood champions to join our mission and inspired change across the country.



Amplifying Our Work in the Field

Practice

We brought our experience with professional development, empowering leaders, and building inclusive and equitable training skills to **7 practice-based presentations at conferences** from coast to coast, including BUILD, Zero to Three and the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC)'s Annual Conference.

We continued to scale proprietary best practices for early education programs nationwide that power program, policy and systems change at every level. Through the [Essential Practices of Educare training series](#), our experts provided training to **27 organizations across 15 states**.

Research

Research and evaluation partners affiliated with the Network also amplified Educare research findings, data and innovation to drive field impact, leading **15+ conference presentations** at local and national levels, publishing **5 peer-reviewed articles** in the most premier early care and education journals, and speaking about Educare's model, priorities and findings in various partner webinar and panel discussions. We shared key learnings on topics such as [parent-staff relationships](#); teacher retention and turnover; program/classroom quality; well-being and early care and education experiences among Black and [Hispanic/Latine children and families](#), dual language learners, and children and families experiencing homelessness or housing insecurity; [social-emotional and language development](#); and so much more. Network researchers and practitioners also partnered on and received funding for topics covering:

- The Assessing Classroom Sociocultural Equity Scale (ACSES)
- Investigating the frequency of critical race theory bans and what they mean for early childhood systems and the workforce
- The growth and evaluation of developmentally appropriate STEM lessons

Policy

As advocates for families and the early childhood workforce across the country, the Network signed on to **15 letters to Congress** advocating for SNAP benefits, child tax credit reinstatement, government action to avoid a shutdown, and funding for emergency childcare, child nutrition and the early childhood field. We [submitted comments in reaction to the notice of proposed rulemaking](#) from the Administration for Children and Families about changes to the Head Start Performance Standards and made **4 legislative endorsements** for policies supporting children, families and communities.

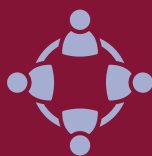
